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Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you are all safe and well.

It has been an interesting week with the snow and ice causing a few problems last weekend and early this week, but we have got through it!

Thank you to those parents and carers who have been to collect our new packs of work, containing brand new workbooks and exercise books, from school. There are still some of you who have not collected them so please do so!

We have had one or two parents contact us, concerned with how much work the children have been asked to do at home. As you may well be aware, we have a duty to provide a certain amount of work as set out by the government: for Key Stage 1, three hours of remote education must be provided and for Key stage 2 pupils should be provided with four hours remote education a day.

However, we know many parents in our community, and indeed across the country, are finding it difficult to support their children and some are finding it difficult to complete the work. Here at Parkfield, we are very much aware of everyone's different circumstances at home; all that we ask is that you do your very best for your children- which is what you do anyway! If you are worried, please let the class teacher know and we will do our best to help you.

On a slightly different point, we have had one or two parents turning up to school with their children because they have either been told by other parents that school is open again, or other reasons. School is currently only open to children who are vulnerable or who have parents as key workers. If you are a key worker, please complete a key worker form which is on the website in the Covid-19 information section. Alternatively, you can collect a form from school from our helpful office staff.

Lastly, thank you for all your commitment and support to the whole school community at this time. You are all amazing and deserve a huge pat on the back! Well done! As always, please do let us know if you have any questions or queries.

Young Carers

A Young Carer is a child under 18 who regularly helps to look after a family member or friend who is disabled, ill, has a mental health condition or addiction problem.

Children may engage in:

Practical tasks (cooking, housework and shopping)

- Physical care (lifting or helping someone use the stairs)
- Personal care (dressing, washing, helping with toilet needs)
- Managing the family budget (collecting benefits and prescriptions)
- Managing medication
- Looking after younger siblings
- Helping someone communicate


Let's get talking!
